The Story of the Yellow Shirt from Vietnam

I signed up for a return trip to Vietnam in 1995, marketed to women who served in Vietnam. A few months before departure, I met a retired Army infantry officer who had gone back to Vietnam in 1993. He asked me if I would mind carrying an envelope of greenbacks to a Vietnamese friend in DaNang. He could tell from my itinerary that the Cham Museum would be the best meeting place. He wrote his friend and told me that I was to look for a cyclo driver holding a sign with my name when our mini-bus arrived at the museum. Everything worked as it was supposed to. This man had been an ARVN artillery officer and blackballed to a job of cyclo driver. His wife was with him, and she had made a personalized pink pillowcase for me to take back to the American infantry officer. It was polyester, ruffled and embroidered with his and his wife's name, their anniversary date, a big heart in the middle, etc. She asked if she could make me one, too. Alas, I said, I was not married so I couldn't use one. I told her that I would show the pillowcase to my travelmates on the bus to see if any of them might be interested. She was to meet us at our next stop, a DaNang restaurant. Just as I thought, no takers on the bus. When she arrived at the restaurant, I felt really discouraged telling her that no one needed a pillowcase. She then asked if I'd like a shirt made. Without a good excuse, I thought I should say yes this time. But since we were driving on to Hue that very afternoon -- how would I receive the shirt? She said, "I'll make it tonight and take the train to Hue tomorrow." I then got out my wallet to pay her, thinking that if I didn't ever see a shirt, losing the money wasn't going to break the bank. She said, "No. You don't have your shirt yet!!" She wanted me to leave one of my shirts with her for measuring, but I only had what I was wearing. So she had to take my measurements right then and there, using the small strip of paper in which the chopsticks at the lunch table had been wrapped. She asked for my color preference, so I said yellow. We agreed to meet in the lobby of my hotel in Hue the next evening. As our mini-bus drove out of DaNang, towards Hue, my bus mates told me to look out the righthand side. There, traveling right along side of us on the back of a motorcycle, was the seamstress, holding up two yellow swatches asking me to choose which of the two I preferred. I signaled the brightest one, and they peeled off. The next day she arrived with my shirt. She chose to embroider my name along side a map of the entire country of Vietnam, a united North and South. She put the date of "1969" next to Saigon in the South and "1995" next to Hanoi in the North. Transaction completed. I had my favorite souvenir of the trip. I made sure I proudly wore it for our arrival in Hanoi.



A hotel reservation will be made for you at the Presidential Hotel, 900 - 19th Street, Northwest, beginning the night of October 27. Due to the crowded conditions of hotels in Washington, all staff are requested to arrive at the hotel on **time** or notify National Headquarters or the hotel well in advance. Also to avoid cancellation prior to arrival, National Headquarters should be notified of the approximate arrival hour of any staff member who expects to arrive after 6:00 p.m. If a wire concerning changes in arrival time is likely to be sent on a weekend or after hours, it is suggested the wire be sent directly to the hotel.

The attached Travel and Advance Authorities should be in your possession when you report to National. At the time you clear in Washington, D.C., your \$300.00 advance will be reduced to \$100.00, so it is necessary that you take a very minimum of the \$100.00 in personal funds with you for personal and emergency expenses not reimbursable.

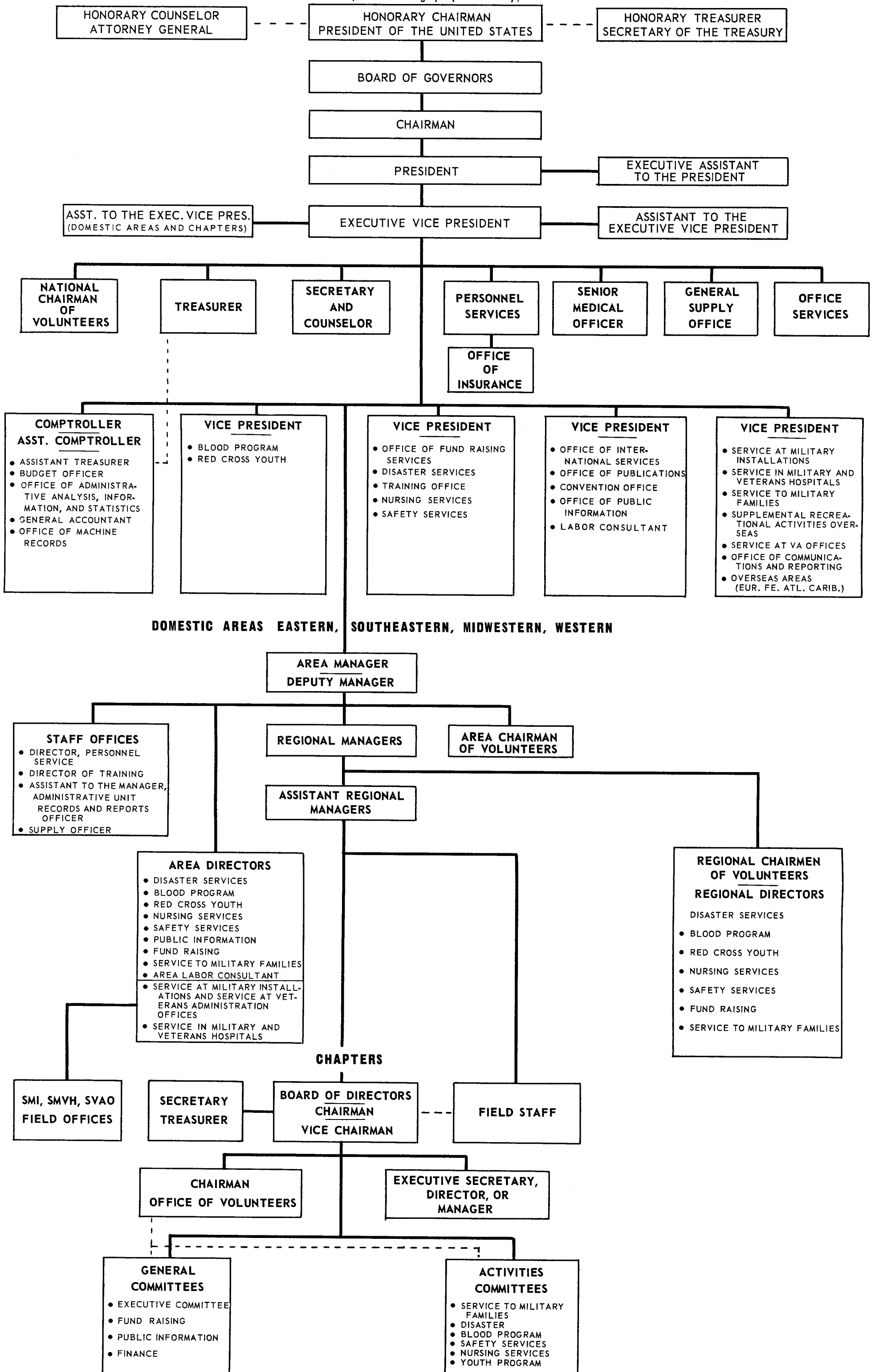

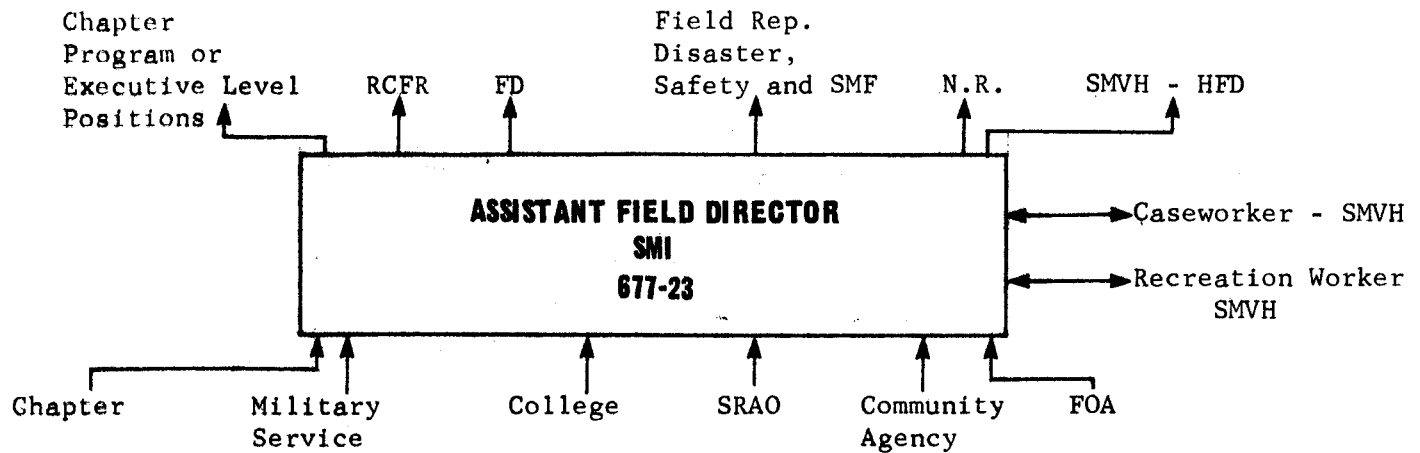

THE RED CROSS MISSION

"The American Red Cross is the instrument chosen by the Congress to help carry out the obligations assumed by the United States under certain international treaties known as the Geneva or Red Cross Conventions. Specifically, its Congressional charter imposes on the American Red Cross the duties to act as the medium of voluntary relief and communication between the American people and their armed forces, and to carry on a system of national and international relief to prevent and mitigate suffering caused by disasters.

"All the activities of the American Red Cross and its chapters support these duties.

"Nationally and locally the American Red Cross is governed by volunteers, most of its duties are performed by volunteers and it is financed by voluntary contributions."

TEN FACTS EVERY RED CROSS WORKER SHOULD KNOW ABOUT HIS ORGANIZATION

(Basic Concepts of the Red Cross)

1. Red Cross societies are established in countries that have signed international agreements (the Geneva Conventions) ensuring protection and assistance to noncombatants in time of war; the wounded, prisoners of war, civilians.
2. Each Red Cross society is a voluntary organization whose programs are designed to prevent and alleviate human suffering and are developed in accordance with the needs of the country.
3. In each country there is only one Red Cross society in which all may serve. It helps people according to their needs and makes no distinction of race, creed, class, or political beliefs.
4. The Red Cross is world wide. It provides a means by which people of many countries work together in meeting human needs and developing world understanding.
5. The American National Red Cross was chartered by the Congress of the United States --

- a. To assist the government in fulfilling obligations undertaken in signing the Geneva Conventions.
 - b. To serve as a link between members of our armed forces and their families.
 - c. To provide relief for victims of disaster in this country and abroad and to plan for disaster preparedness.
6. In keeping with the broad Red Cross principles and with the provisions of the Congressional charter, American Red Cross programs of service are created according to human needs and are changed as changing conditions create new needs.
 7. American Red Cross services provide:
 - a. Direct assistance to individuals and families in meeting crises and emergencies.
 - b. Instruction to promote health and safety.
 - c. Organization through which people can help one another, locally, nationally, and internationally.
 8. The American National Red Cross carries its service into all parts of our country by authorizing (chartering) chapters.
 9. Volunteer boards (national and chapter) determine what the American Red Cross programs of service will be and the policies by which these programs will be carried out by volunteer and paid staff working in partnership.
 10. The basic funds for all American Red Cross activities are raised in the local communities through annual drives for members and funds. The Red Cross is accountable to the American people for the money it receives. Its accounts are audited by the Department of Defense and reported annually to the Congress and the public.

THE CONGRESSIONAL CHARTER

Section 3 (Purposes)

That the purposes of this corporation are and shall be -

First To furnish volunteer aid to the sick and wounded of Armed Forces in time of war, in accordance with the spirit and conditions of the conference of Geneva of October, eighteen hundred and sixty-three, and also the treaties of the Red Cross, or the treaties of Geneva, of August twenty-second, eighteen hundred and sixty-four, and July twenty-seventh, nineteen hundred and twenty-nine, to which the United States of America has given its adhesion, and also of any other treaty or convention similar in purpose to which the United States of America may hereafter give its adhesion.

Second And for the said purposes to perform all the duties devolved upon a national society by each nation which has acceded to any of said treaties or conventions.

Third To succeed to all the rights and property which have been hitherto held and to all the duties which have heretofore been performed by the American National Red Cross as a corporation duly incorporated by Act of Congress June sixth, nineteen hundred, which Act is hereby repealed and the organization created thereby is hereby dissolved.

Fourth To act in matters of voluntary relief and in accord with the military authorities as a medium of communication between the people of the United States of America and their Armed Forces, and to act in such matters between similar national societies of other governments through the "Comité International de Secours," and the Government and the people and the Armed Forces of the United States of America.

Fifth And to continue and carry on a system of national and international relief in time of peace and apply the same in mitigating the sufferings caused by pestilence, famine, fire, floods, and other great national calamities, and to devise and carry on measures for preventing the same.
